Education and Schooling: A call for genuine collaboration among stakeholders.

t a recent meeting of selected leaders in the top echelon of the Nigerian educational system which comprised the Minister of Education, Minister of State for Education, the Registrar of Joint Admission and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and a cross-section of Vice-Chancellors from Nigerian public and private universities, the JAMB's Registrar openly criticized some



university leaders for engaging in what he described as illegal admissions of students to the detriment of the Nigerian educational system. He emphasised the need for age-appropriate-admissions of students towards the enhancement of quality performances that are based on the students' school readiness and competencies. It is noteworthy, that he openly cited a personal example by highlighting how he made his own children adhere to the standards of age-appropriate admissions and learning that he was advocating and insistent on compliance. Therefore, he was exercising an exemplary moral authority through his advocacy for compliance. Similarly, there are on-going agitations and appeals for the review of the Nigerian national curriculum to incorporate relevant skills, entrepreneurship, patriotism and characterbuilding. The foregoing resonates with similar contributions and appeals that are generally highlighted at various stakeholders' meetings and most arguments are often geared towards the attainment of better outcomes for students. However, the process of attaining better outcomes for learners confers some responsibilities on all stakeholders, including the students who need to imbibe the combined culture of diligence and ethical conducts. The purpose of this article therefore is to appeal to all stakeholders in education (government, parents, school owners, educational leaders, teachers, educational consultants, students, etc) to be genuinely intentional about the quality and processes of education that is provided to various categories of learners, as well as to collaborate to sustain it in its purest form.

Meanwhile, it is a global reality that most of life's outcomes are the results of human choices and related actions. Moreover, empirical research confirms that, despite a few exceptions, the lived experiences of people have proven that noticeable results are the outcomes of earlier actions or inactions by individual or concerned group of individuals. This is referred to as the input and output principle or the law of causes and effects. Despite this, this universal principle is frequently denied in some sections, yet it can be established from the Holy Scriptures that God Almighty allows His divinely-sanctioned law of nature to prevail in many areas of human life and the society. From this, it is safer to argue that, all things being equal, the future outcomes of many young people, can be premised on the type and quality of education they receive and imbibe. It is instructive that the African societies are generally plagued by incompetent and/or corrupt leaders who are mostly the products of their various societies, vis-à-vis the process of their socialisation, including education. This is why it is important to give children quality education, both formally and informally.

Informal education of learners is obtained through informal settings and it includes the trainings from the homes and other agents of socialisation, whereas formal education is received through the formal process of schooling. Invariably, students' performances in examinations and other areas of endeavours, including the handling of opportunities and resources are often dependent on the quality and personal dedication to the education received. Therefore, it is important that stakeholders pay attention to, and ensure that all categories of learners are provided with qualitative education that is accompanied with necessary character training because as the saying goes, "it is the attitude that determines the altitude." In other words, genuine emphasis should be on rounded and tested education that goes beyond the idiosyncrasies of individuals that are sometimes enforced as standard measures of education in some sections of our society. Undoubtedly, this is the reason for diminishing emphasis on quality education and international best practices. There is a tilting towards a rather unfortunate disingenuous interpretive approach to educational practices that is eroding academic and human values among young people. Some time-tested indicators of quality education that notable educational authorities and institutions, including the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) advocate, such as age-appropriateness, readiness for school, learners'

aptitude, personal commitment, resilience and related attributes are being relegated and sacrificed for expediencies. Therefore, it is becoming increasingly difficult to train students in "learning and character" and our society is getting saturated with unreasonable deviants. Meanwhile, some schools are getting populated with students, who, rather than engage in diligent studies and ethical behaviour to pass examinations and gain promotions, are getting away with their unwillingness to learn and disobedience. Consequently and with clear instances, our immediate environs is saturated with an army of youth whose main engagement is online frauds and other forms of social vices. Unfortunately, some of these are emboldened by many unconcerned or conniving adults. This scenario is a call to genuine reflections and true wisdom from all stakeholders in the industry because we all stand to gain or lose, from the eventual outcomes of these students and might be vicariously liable before God Almighty. It is important therefore that every one of us commit to making and supporting the right choices in the educational landscape in terms of age-appropriateness, quality, quantity, necessity of moral training, transparent examples as well as engage in mutually-respectful collaborations with other stakeholders for the sustenance of best practices and processes. Together, we are duty-bound to support, guide and build the young people under our areas of influence in order to transform them to become worthy models to their generations and our ailing society. Our conducts and examples matters too, because instructions and/or promises from adults that are based on assumptions without accompanying personal integrity, trustworthiness and moral authority will not yield significant results.

In conclusion, as a trained educator/practitioner and industry leader who has been practically involved at all levels of education from the elementary school to the university level for several years, I propose, among others, some critical areas for stakeholders' collaborations in our current space in the following:

- Genuine enforcement of age-appropriate admissions based on learners' emotional and school readiness at all levels of education, by all school leaders and parents alike.
- Parents' demands for quality educational services should be presented without insulting educational practitioners and should be rightfully accepted as necessary feedback.

- Placing continuous emphasis on a balanced development of learners' aptitude and attitude.
- Training students to be respectful to their teachers, instructors and school leaders to avoid demotivating the latter on their jobs.
- Adherence to the principles of education, best practices and avoidance of double-standards or the enforcement of irrelevant activities that distract and stifle development of the total child.
- Accepting the fact that we are all partners-in-progress who are currently engaged in mutually beneficial relationships that demand shared respect from all parties in order to achieve our noble objectives (development of the total child and ultimately, all-round success for learners). Dear parents, potential parents and all other stakeholders, I believe this new (2024-2025) academic session provides us with fresh opportunities to work together and achieve greater results, especially as we continue to work for the interest of the learners and the glory of God Almighty.

It was renamed in 1804 in recognition of a gift from Nicholas Brown, a prominent Providence businessman and alumnus.

According to national centre for educational statistics 2019, bullied students reported that bullying occurred in the following places: Hallway 43%, inside the classroom 42%, in the cafeteria 27%, outside on school ground 22%, online or by text 15%, in the bathroom or locker room 12%, and on the school bus 8%.

With all that has been stated, bullying is a big issue, if not tackled in collectively. Though the cycle didn't start from you, it can end with you. It is safe to say the quote "Hurt people hurt people": which means individuals who have experienced pain, trauma or harm are likely to inflict hurt on others. Pain patterns get passed on generation after generation and from person to person. On the contrary, one can meet anger with sympathy, contempt with compassion, and cruelty with kindness.

Bullying can take many forms including verbal, physical, and cyber bullying. Acknowledging bullying as a problem is a start to stop this cruel act. We need to acknowledge the signs and take them seriously, we need to teach empathy and kindness, we need to create a safe environment, and hold bullies accountable for their actions by teaching and promoting kindness and inclusivity.

This is a very serious issue that not only affects children but also adults; and this generation, being a fast- growing, technology-based generation, awareness needs to be put out because bullying grows in silence and so as not to create a generation that thrives and normalizes bullying, especially cyber bullying, parents need to create a safe and loving environment for their children.

So, let's break the cycle of bullying not by fighting fire, but by extinguishing the flames with empathy and compassion. Let us build a world where our unique qualities are cherished, our vulnerabilities are supported, and our words uplift one another. Let us prove that we are capable of overcoming our fears, doubts, and harsh words to create a more compassionate, and loving society. Together we can create a brighter future where everyone can feel safe and valued.


