Malaria is a disease caused by the bite of a female 'anopheles' mosquito. Malaria is often called "the silent killer" due to the lack of attention it receives. On a worldwide scale, the disease affects between 200 million to 500 million people annually. Ninety percent of these cases occur in tropical Africa. In terms of mortality, children under the age of five are the most vulnerable group, with some 700,000 dying in Africa each year. This death toll exceeds that of the AIDS disease. Adults are less likely to die from malaria, but still suffer from the sickness.

The World Health Organization (WHO) began malaria control programs in 1948 by spraying mosquito-breeding sites with insecticides and also administering anti-malaria drugs. Parents should ensure to protect their children from mosquito bites through the use of mosquito nets and other available commercial options.
